The Loveliest Girl in the World is a Finnish photography project, realized by photographer and arts and social educator Miina Savolainen with ten girls growing up in Hyvönen's children's home in Helsinki, Finland, over a ten-year period. In 1998 Savolainen started to photograph children who had been mistreated growing up following to their personal wishes. This was done to get the children and those around them to appreciate their worth. Behind it was her understanding that verbal communication was not a sufficient tool to heal children whose trust had been broken with words. The Loveliest Girl in the World is a touching archetypal coming-of-age story of an overlooked child becoming visible and gaining self-acceptance. In the project photos the girls got to see themselves as whole and valuable.

Empowering photography got its start from the project Loveliest Girl In The World, and has been in use in Finland in therapy, education, and workplace development since the year 2000. An award winning social innovation developed by Miina Savolainen elevates the exchange of a gaze into a powerful communication tool in human interaction as well as care giving and education. The basic tenet of the method is to redirect the action and power of the photographer into a process of dialogue with the subject and to make the photograph a tool for self discovery and exploration of identity for the subject. Even people who are close to you see completely different things in the same photo. This creates a dialogue: what is true and important for me, for you, and for both of us together? Miina Savolainen is a community art oriented photographer from Helsinki whose works deal with social engagement and empowerment. She has covered the topic of fatherhood, among others, and is currently working on a community art project involving intersexed and transgendered individuals.
